






- Fire Division call volume approaching 6,000
- Increased by over 200 calls due to COVID-19
- 5 firefighter/paramedic cadets have been hired
- Continued partnership with Cleveland Clinic Mobile Stroke Unit





New 2021 state-of-the-art ambulance will be delivered in November 2021





- Police Division received over 32,000 calls for service in 2020
- 9 police officers, 3 auxiliary officers, 1 corrections officer hired in 2020 and 2021
- Expanding the digital training program to keep up to date with latest skills and topics
- Continued Shop with a Cop and Trunk or Treat community events





- Implemented new technology to help keep the community safe
 - Purchased 32 Flock Cameras
 - \$168,000 project
 - License plate reader and crime prevention tool
 - Cameras will be placed at entrances to the City and at key points within the City







- 18.6 lane miles of roads have been resurfaced from 2016 with another 5.5 miles of resurfacing scheduled for 2022
- Over \$4M in grants awarded for water line replacements, sewer repairs, streetlighting and tree canopy
- Cut the ribbon on the \$3M+ Dunham Road Resurfacing and Bike Lanes Project
- City Hall Elevator Project started over 85% grant funded





- Food Pantry stayed open offering parking lot pickup
- Mobile Food Pantry saw over 200%
 increase in families served since March 2020
- 110 individuals registered and transported to COVID-19 vaccination sites
- Over 20,000 home delivered meals and over 6,500 "Grab and Go" meals served









Regular Services Maintained


- Community Shred Days offered in May and October

- Housing Resource Fair scheduled to offer opportunity to enroll in Homestead and property tax payment plans, utility assistance, and share home repair resources








- 1,429 building permits issued in 2020

- Investigated and cited over 1,300
 property maintenance complaints in 2021
- Hired a new Code Enforcement Officer






- 2 new homes built on Jefferson Avenue
 the first built in a decade
- Homes sold for \$189,900 and \$217,000 on Jefferson Avenue
- 5 new homes planned for construction in Fall 2021 and Spring 2022
- Median sales price is now over \$80,000









Brought Back the City's Paint Program

 Assisted 8 families with painting the exterior of their home and improving curb appeal

City Land Bank

- 18 families are in the process of purchasing a side yard from the City
- Estimated to increase equity in their home by \$7,000 per lot purchased
- Sold 5 parcels to developers for new single-family home contruction








Beautiful Yard Campaign



Maintaining a Financially Stable Government

- Focusing on Delivering Excellent City Services to Residents Efficiently
 - Restructure departments to recruit and retain top talent
 - Expand the responsibilities of the Departments of Human Services and Economic Development, Building, and Housing
 - Establish and staff a Division of Youth Services, providing youth
 programs and coordination with the Maple Heights School District

- Ensuring the City Government is Proactive and Responsive
 - Establish the Exterior Maintenance Grant Program to assist homeowners with larger home repairs, such as roofs, driveways, and windows
 - Improve community health through access to parks and amenities
 - Expand access to broadband internet to support lifelong learning and career readiness
