## POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Maple Heights Police Department (MHPD) is a full-service agency comprised of patrol officers, detectives, supervisors, correction officers, auxiliary officers, crossing guards, records clerks, and evidence personnel. The department is active in the community, attending and hosting events. MHPD is part of the Southeast Area Law Enforcement (SEALE) regional group. SEALE is a seven-city partnership for advanced law enforcement services to include Specialized Weapons and Tactics team (SWAT), bomb squad (HDU), Crisis Intervention Team (CIT), Accident Investigation Unit (AIU), Missing Persons Unit (MPU), Tactical Medics, and an award-winning full-time Narcotics Task Force (SNTF).

MHPD also has an Animal Control Officer (ACO). The ACO helps enforce all the wildlife ordinances of the city and statutes of the State of Ohio. We provide trapping services and removal of some nuisance animals. Trapping does not occur in the winter months. ## FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Maple Heights Fire Department provides 24/7 fire protection and emergency medical services to the city. It operates out of two fire stations: Fire Station 1, located at 5520 Warrensville Center Road, and Fire Station 2, located at 5720 Dunham Road. Each station is equipped with a fire engine and an ambulance, and both are staffed by firefighters who are certified paramedics.

In the event of an emergency, residents should call 911. For non-emergency inquiries, please contact the administrative office at 216-662-6035, available Monday through Friday from 8 AM to 5 PM.

The Maple Heights Fire Department also offers free smoke detectors to homeowners through a program run by the American Red Cross. Additionally, the Fire Prevention Bureau employs a certified fire inspector who can provide information on fire and life safety practices.

### Jurisdiction

**The Maple Heights Mayor's Court has limited jurisdiction based on geographic location and type of offense.**

All offenses **must** have occurred in the City of Maple Heights. Some charges may not be filed here because of legal exceptions. The court **does not** handle any civil or small claims matters. Those cases are referred to the Garfield Heights Municipal Court, which also has jurisdiction over certain other criminal and traffic cases.

### Paying a Parking Ticket

You may pay a parking ticket at the Mayor's Court in person, by mail, or online.

Unpaid tickets will be subject to further penalties.

You can only search by name, not ticket number.

### In Person:

- Payments in person may be made by cash, check or credit card.  
The person making the payments will be given a receipt.

### Mail:

- Payments **must** be postmarked /received before the date specified on the ticket.  
Do not count weekends or holidays in the 72 hour period.

### Paying a Ticket by Waiver

At the time of the offense you **must** have provided the Officer proof of insurance. The Officer should have checked the proper box on the ticket.. If the Officer did not check the box as "yes" you **must** provide the court with your proof of insurance by bringing it in or mailing a copy with your payment. **NO INVOICES**: Insurance **must** cover the date of offense.

- Have one of the waiver-able offenses listed on the chart (can be found on City of Maple Heights website).
- Enter a plea of "GUILTY".
- Read the ticket carefully; sign the reverse side of the citation and enclose with payment or bring to court with you if paying in person.
- Have the TOTAL waiver payment to the court before your assigned court date.

The Maple Heights Building Department is responsible for permitting the construction and enforcement of the City's Property Maintenance, Building and Housing, and Zoning Codes. We partner with property owners in an effort to build and maintain high-quality residential, commercial, and industrial structures within the City of Maple Heights.

**All rental residences must** be registered with the City annually. Permits from the Building Department are required for **any contractor** or business doing work in your home or on your property. All contractors **must** be registered with the City.

The Department of Housing encourages reinvestment in and revitalization of the City's neighborhoods and homes to improve the quality of life in the City. The Department builds relationships with public- and private-sector partners to leverage resources for property owners to invest in the City's housing stock. In building these relationships, the Department brings resources and information to residents to invest in their homes and make their home meet the demands of their families.

The owner and or occupants are responsible for maintaining clean, sanitary and safe properties. They **must** be kept weather-tight and the exterior of all structures **must** be kept free from decay or deterioration.

Exterior surfaces should be kept clean, repaired, and painted or resurfaced when necessary. Yards should be kept clean, neat, and attractive at all times.

Trash receptacles cannot be set out earlier than 6:00 PM the day before collection and cans should be removed from the tree lawn no later than 6:00 PM the following day. Rubbish cans and receptacles **must** be stored at least 25 feet from any house.

Commercial or business vehicle parking, outdoors, is not permitted in residential areas. Unlicensed or seldom moved vehicles are not permitted to be parked in the open at a residence or most businesses. Vehicles **must** be parked only on a paved surface.

## CODIFIED ORDINANCES

### **452.14 Parking Between 2:00 AND 6:00 A.M. Prohibited**

No person shall park any vehicle upon any public street in the City between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. of each calendar day. (Ord. 1966-200. Passed 4-5-67; Ord. 2021-74. Passed 9-15-21.)

### **452.17 Snow Emergencies**

Whenever, during any period of 24 hours or less, snow falls in the City, or in any section thereof, to a depth of two inches or more, an emergency is hereby declared to exist in that such a depth of snow constitutes a serious public hazard, impairing transportation, the movement of food, fuel and other supplies, medical care, fire, health and police protection, and other vital facilities of the City.

The Mayor or the Chief of Police shall make a reasonable effort to announce the existence of the emergency by the use of the local press and radio and television stations. Such emergency shall continue until an announcement by the Mayor or the Chief that snow plowing operations have been completed and that the emergency is terminated. However, owners and operators of motor vehicles shall have the responsibility of determining existing weather conditions and depth or extent of snow fall, and to comply with emergency parking regulations when such emergency is in effect.

During the period of the emergency, the Mayor or the Chief may prohibit the parking of vehicles upon any or all of the City streets. During such emergency, no person shall park or cause to be parked, or permit to be parked, or abandon or leave unattended, any motor vehicle of any kind on any of the City's streets or roads. However, vehicles may be parked for a period of no longer than three minutes for the actual loading or unloading of passengers, or 30 minutes for the actual loading or unloading of property or goods, provided that the operator of such vehicle is immediately available, and provided further than no other section of this chapter, or any other ordinance of the City restricting parking as to time or place, is violated.

Any motor vehicle parked in violation of this section shall be towed away and charged in accordance with Section 404.05.

(e) Whoever violates this section is guilty of a minor misdemeanor and shall be subject to the penalty provided in Section 698.02 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Maple Heights.

### **680.05 Procedures to Abate Nuisances Involving Vegetation**

The following procedures shall apply to the abatement of a nuisance as defined by Section [680.01\(a\)\(2\)](#):

(a) It shall be the responsibility of each owner of property within the City to maintain their property and abutting tree lawns in a manner that prevents any weeds or grass from growing six inches or higher in height and that prevents any vegetation from obstructing views compromising safe ingress or egress or otherwise impeding traffic, including pedestrian traffic, on any public rights-of-way. If the owner does not cut or destroy, or cause to be cut or destroyed, vegetation as required herein, the Mayor or designee is authorized to cause said nuisance to be cut. Such abatement may be issued by the Mayor or designee without reporting said nuisance to Council in the manner provided herein.

(b) The owner of property determined to be in violation of this section shall be served a written notice upon the first identified violation per calendar year. Such notice shall state that the owner has two calendar days to cut or destroy, or cause to be cut or destroyed, any weeds or grass that is six inches or higher in height or any vegetation that obstructs views compromising safe ingress or egress or otherwise impedes traffic, including pedestrian traffic, on any public rights-of-way. Further, the notice shall conspicuously state that failure to comply will result in the City causing the work to be done and the costs to be assessed against the property in the manner provided by this section. The notice shall also conspicuously state that any subsequent violations of this section concerning the same property during the same calendar year shall require no further notice.

(c) When it is deemed necessary for the City to cut vegetation, in accordance with the provisions of this section, the owner shall be charged at the rate of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00) per hour or portion thereof, or the actual cost of the work, whichever is larger. The minimum charge shall be one hundred dollars (\$100.00). Within 30 calendar days after such work is performed, the City shall serve an order to the owner to pay the cost of such cutting, which shall include a statement of the amount of costs incurred and an explanation of the appeals process set forth in Section 680.10 herein. The order shall additionally state that failure to pay within 30 calendar days or timely appeal will result in the charge being certified to the County Fiscal Officer for collection as other taxes and assessments are collected.

(d) If within 30 calendar days after the mailing of the order, the cost is neither paid nor timely appealed, it may be certified to the County Fiscal Officer for collection as other taxes and assessments are collected or the City may seek recovery of such costs by civil action against the property owner involved. An Affidavit of Facts shall be filed if more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) has been expended by the City in abating the nuisance.

If you receive this warning notice at your home, please take heed to address the violation listed by the Inspector. The City requires that properties be maintained in a manner that does not add a blighting affect to the surrounding community. Grass longer than six (6) inches and overgrown bushes can not only become unsightly, but bring down the overall feel of our beautiful community. The City has the authority to abate and charge the property owner for these conditions (please see below).

**680.05 PROCEDURES TO ABATE NUISANCES INVOLVING VEGETATION.**

(c) When it is deemed necessary for the City to cut vegetation, in accordance with the provisions of this section, the owner shall be charged at the rate of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00) per hour or portion thereof, or the actual cost of the work, whichever is larger. The minimum charge shall be one hundred dollars (\$100.00). Within 30 calendar days after such work is performed, the City shall serve an order to the owner to pay the cost of such cutting, which shall include a statement of the amount of costs incurred and an explanation of the appeals process set forth in Section 680.10 herein. The order shall additionally state that failure to pay within 30 calendar days or timely appeal will result in the charge being certified to the County Fiscal Officer for collection as other taxes and assessments are collected.

The Maple Heights Service Department handles many tasks throughout the city, ranging from snow removal to street repairs, as well as various recycling events in partnership with the Cuyahoga County Solid Waste District during the year.

### Services

#### Hazardous Waste Round-up

Computer component and oil based paint, as well as many other hazardous waste items, can be dropped off at the service garage year-round, weekdays ONLY from 7:30 AM until 3:00 PM.

(No latex paint!) For questions about specific items for disposal please call the office at (216) 587-9014.

Oil: Residents can return used oil in approved containers to the service garage. Please use the second entrance closest to Benhoff Drive – the oil recycling station is located on the north side of the driveway approximately 200 feet from Dunham Road.

Fluorescent Bulbs (CFL): The Service department does NOT accept fluorescent bulbs/ CFL's for recycling or disposal. Lowe's Home Improvement stores accepts CFL's and Fluorescent Bulbs for disposal at their stores.

House Sanitary Sewers: Please call the Cuyahoga County Sanitary Engineer's Office at (216) 443-8201 if you are experiencing sewer backup. In many cases, they will respond to your call the same day.

Leaf Collection: Leaf collection takes place between October and December of each year, weather permitting.



For the most up to date street locations and dates or in the event of extreme or inclement weather, please continue to check the City's website, or call the Leaf Removal Hotline at (216) 587-9015. Leaves need to be placed on the tree lawn **NOT** on the STREET. The piles should **NOT** contain twigs, branches, grass clippings, trash, or animal waste. The Service Department asks that cars or vehicles not impede the pickup process. **ONLY RAKED PILES WILL BE PICKED UP.**



Waste Management continues to provide courteous and dependable curbside collection to keep Maple Heights clean and green. Waste is collected once per week on either Thursday or Friday.

**North of Broadway Ave. (Rt 14), pickup day is Thursday.**

**South of Broadway Ave. (Rt 14), pickup day is Friday.**

Please have your trash cart at the curb by 7 a.m. on your regular collection day. Make sure all trash is bagged before placing in your cart.

ONLY 2 additional Items allowed outside your trash cart. Fill your trash cart first - cart **must** be filled completely with trash and/or yard waste before your 2 extra cans or bags may be placed outside the cart. The 2 extra cans or bags outside the cart **must** weigh less than 50 lbs.

# City of Maple Heights

## Housing and Building Department: A Must-Know Guide for Homeowners

### Lawn Maintenance

- Property owners are responsible for maintaining grass at a height of 6 inches or less
- The City will assess and invoice for the cutting of any non-compliant yards at a minimum rate of \$150.00 per parcel

### Trash & Recycling

- Trash cans may be placed on the tree lawn no earlier than 6:00 PM the day before collection, and cans must be removed from the tree lawn no later than 8:00 AM the following day
  - No trash should be left on tree lawn at any other time
- Trash is collected one day late the week of an observed holiday

- Assistance with a new or replacement trash can contact the Service Department 216-587-9014.

### Annual Systematic Inspection Program

- A Code Enforcer will conduct an inspection from the sidewalk of each house in the assigned yearly section
- Property owners do not need to be home when the team member is conducting the inspection
- If violations are found, property owners will receive a violation notice in the mail and are given 90 days for the first violation notice to correct the violations
- A team member will re-inspect the property for compliance after the compliance period
- If an extension is needed or there are questions regarding cited violations, please contact the Building and Housing Department

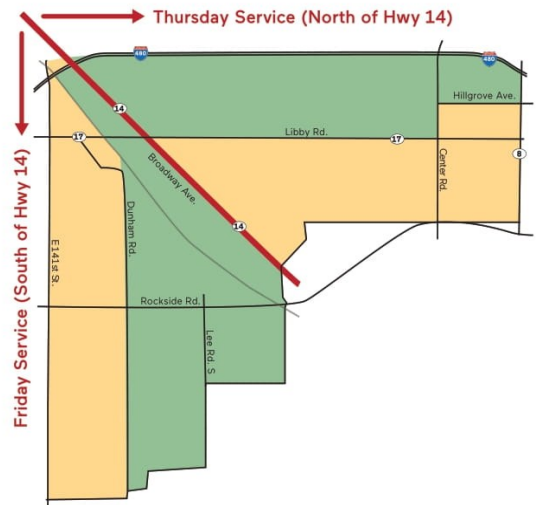

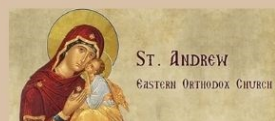

## PARKS AND RECREATION

### STAFFORD PARK

Stafford Park is centrally located in Maple Heights at 5400 Mayville Avenue and boasts 3 large pavilions, tennis courts, basketball courts, and baseball diamonds, attracting thousands of visitors to the park each year. The park has ample parking, and over 35 acres of natural woods, picnic areas, a playground, grills and greenspace for residents. Stafford Park is home to the story book trail, fitness course and a new bandstand for our Music in the Park Summer Series.

**To reserve a pavilion at Stafford Park, please call 216-587-5481. Reservations accepted April 1st through September 30th.**

### BENHOFF PARK

Benhoff Park is located off of Dunham Road - either Fernway or Benhoff Drives will 'dead end' at the end of the street into the park. It was one-time home to the Maple Heights Youth Baseball and Soccer leagues, it also has a playground and large parking lot.

### SOUTHGATE USA PARK

Southgate USA Park is a 1 acre neighborhood park located between Edgewood and Northwood Avenues. The park has benches, a swing set and slide and several other playground amenities, but there is no parking lot.

### CUNWILLOW PARK

Cunwillow Park is located off Garden and Home Streets, and features a large field, benches, a playground with a swing set and slide, and basketball courts. This neighborhood park does not have a parking lot, and closes at sundown.

### D.A.R.E PARK

D.A.R.E. Park is located on Friend Avenue, and can be accessed from either the backside of the County Library or from Friend Avenue. It is a smaller neighborhood park, with a swing set, merry-go-round and jungle gym. This park closes at sundown.

### DUNHAM PARK

Dunham Park is located on the western edge of Maple Heights at 15005 Schreiber Rd. Dunham Park is owned and operated by the Cleveland Metroparks. [www.clevelandmetroparks.com](http://www.clevelandmetroparks.com)

### MAPLE HEIGHTS SPRAYGROUND

The sprayground is located at Stafford Park and features fun water accessories to be enjoyed by all. It opens from June through August. The dates are determined by the Maple Heights City Schools summer recess. The sprayground hours are Noon - 7:00 PM, weather permitting and is closed on Monday and Wednesday.

**Park Rules:** The parks shall only be open between the hours of dawn and dusk, except for Cunwillow Park (aka Home Street Park), the D.A.R.E. Park on Friend Avenue, and Southgate USA Park on Glenwood Avenue which will close at 8:00 p.m., or dusk, whichever is earlier. Alcoholic beverages are prohibited in the parks. Dogs are not permitted in the parks. The disposal of garbage, debris or waste on City park or recreation property is prohibited. (MH Ord. 1062.03)

# MAPLE HEIGHTS HISTORICAL SOCIETY AND MUSEUM

The Maple Heights Historical Society is a non-profit organization committed to maintaining and sharing the history of the City of Maple Heights and its residents and fostering a deeper appreciation of our community free of charge through the operation of the Little Red Schoolhouse Museum.

The little red brick building was built in 1871 as a one room school for children of the earliest residents of Bedford Township. The little red schoolhouse is now being used as a museum that is run by the Maple Heights Historical Society.. The museum is sole repository for all local memorabilia from city hall, police and fire departments and local public schools. In addition, the museum has collections from local civic and fraternal organizations, local businesses, churches and early community founders.

As a museum, it houses many items of general interest to Ohio and Maple Heights residents and visitors. Included in the collection are:

- 1) Twenty-three composite pictures of Maple Heights High School graduating classes, beginning with the class of 1926.
- 2) The PBX switchboard from the old fire station.
- 3) The cast iron identification plaque from the old Dunham Road Bridge.
- 4) Household tools and equipment and many personal treasures donated by long time residents of Maple Heights.

## QUALITY OF LIFE ISSUES & ANSWERS

### WHAT DOES 'QUALITY OF LIFE' MEAN?

Everyone wants to live and work in a safe, secure, clean, and friendly community and the City of Maple Heights wants to help our residents and business owners achieve this goal. Many issues affect this standard of living and impact the rights of residents and property owners to use and enjoy their properties. To truly live in a community means that neighbors and business owners do not abuse their property rights or behave in ways that interfere with their neighbors' enjoyment and use of their property. Issues such as dogs constantly barking or running loose; loud music being played at all hours; children violating curfew; yards with overgrown grass, weeds, bushes, trash, and debris; cars parked on grass; trespassing, loitering, and damaging of property; trash taken out early and empty trash containers left out are all examples of behaviors which lead to neighborhood decline. The City of Maple Heights has a number of laws that address these nuisances which threaten property rights and destroy the community's "Quality of Life".

### NOISE VIOLATIONS

Music **cannot** be played at a volume to disturb the quiet or comfort of others whether it comes from your house or car. Do not mow your lawn or have contractors work on your home before 8 AM or after 10 PM.

There are some restaurants and bars in and near neighborhoods in Maple Heights. They **must** keep their bands/music within proper limits between 11 PM and 8 AM.

There are a number of ordinances related to noise of all kinds; from work and industry, from recreation and enjoyment, from personal devices and at homes, and from vehicles and in shopping centers to name a few. Generally, being a good neighbor and keeping quality of life high for all would entail keeping noise to a minimum between the hours of 10 PM and 8 AM. Please refer to the City Ordinances for specific types of noise and violations if you have questions. The Police Department can also answer questions.



## CURFEW

Curfew hours for youths **under 15** years old are 9 PM to 6 AM. Curfew hours for juveniles **over 15** years but under 18 years old are 11 PM to 5 AM. This applies to juveniles not accompanied by an adult. Parents and guardians have the responsibility for enforcing curfew regulations.

Parents, for your children's safety, please instruct children to **walk on the sidewalks** and not in the streets at all times, especially when walking to and from school, and not to play in the streets. No one has the right to cut across someone's yard, sit on their porch or steps, or congregate on someone's lawn or driveway without permission – that is **trespassing**.

No person shall congregate with others on the sidewalk, street, parks, playgrounds, or businesses with the intent to provoke or breach the peace of other persons, by seriously annoying the other persons, by threatening, insulting or abusive conduct or language, and refusing to move-on when ordered by Police.

## PROPERTY MAINTENANCE

**Cut your grass on a regular basis**, both in front and back yards. **Grass cannot exceed 6 inches** in length. Front yard bushes and weeds shall be maintained so as not to cause a nuisance. Front yard bushes cannot obstruct your view or your neighbor's view while backing out of the driveway, and cannot exceed three feet in height to provide a clear view of traffic and pedestrians. Do not pile snow on the tree lawn to obstruct the view of oncoming cars, and please, clear the sidewalks so our children can walk to school safely.

## YOUR PETS AND THEIRS

**BE A RESPONSIBLE PET OWNER** and pick up after your animal. Do not permit your pet to do their business on another property. All dogs **must** be on a leash or gated in your backyard. Dogs should not bark or howl to disturb the quiet of any neighbor.

City code **does not** permit more than five dogs or cats combined, over 3 months of age, on any one property. Please report animal cruelty to the Maple Heights Animal Control Officer.

## PARKING

**Parking** is prohibited on all streets between 2 AM and 6 AM every night - AND also on all streets **at all times** when snow exceeds 2 inches.

No abandoned, or **unlicensed vehicles** are allowed to be stored or parked on your property. If you do not disrupt your neighbor, you may work on a vehicle **that is owned by you** in your driveway. Vehicles are not to be parked on grassy areas of yards.

## INCOME TAXES

The municipal income tax rate for the City of Maple Heights is 2.5%. This tax is imposed on all salaries and compensations (Payroll Tax) and annual net profits of businesses. Residents receive a 100% credit for up to 2.5% income taxes paid to another community. All residents are required to file a return whether or not they owe income tax. Residents are required to pay estimated taxes if the anticipated amount due is expected to equal or exceed \$10.00. City tax returns are due April 15.



The Regional Income Tax Agency (R.I.T.A.) in Cleveland acts as administrator and enforcer of the city tax for Maple Heights and various other communities.
